COMPLAINT

The Investigative Committee of the Nevada State Board of Medical Examiners (Board), composed the of of **Thomas** В. Berndt, M.D., Chairman, time filing Valerie J. Clark, BSN, RHU, LUTCF, Member, and Michael J. Fischer, M.D., Member, by and through Erin L. Albright, Esq., Attorney for the Investigative Committee and Deputy General Counsel, having a reasonable basis to believe that Thomas Abdella, M.D. (Respondent), violated the provisions of Nevada Revised Statutes(NRS) Chapter 630 (Medical Practice Act), hereby issues its formal Complaint, stating the Investigative Committee's charges and allegations as follows:

- 1. Respondent is currently licensed in active status (License No. 7589), and has been so licensed since October 12, 1995 by the Board pursuant to the provisions of the Medical Practice Act.
- 2. Patient A was a forty-three (43)-year-old female at the time of the incident in question. Her true identity is not disclosed in this Complaint to protect her identity, but her identity is disclosed in the Patient Designation served on Respondent along with a copy of this Complaint.

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- 3. On June 17, 2005, Patient A had a gestational age of approximately 34 weeks when she presented to the emergency room at the University Medical Center (hereinafter "UMC") in Las Vegas, Nevada, complaining of abdominal pressure, difficulty breathing, bilateral lower extremity edema and spotting. She was admitted to UMC with a diagnosis of maternal tachycardia and preeclampsia.
- After Patient A was admitted, her blood pressure was 165/115, there was protein in her urine, and she suffered from a severe headache. Further testing also diagnosed Patient A with anemia and dyspnea. Approximately fourteen (14) hours after the patient was admitted to UMC, Respondent personally reviewed Patient A's chart and did not order induced labor.
- 5. On June 18, 2005, Patient A's blood pressure was 164/88, her urine output was very low, and she still complained of a headache. Respondent personally reviewed Patient A's chart a second time and, again, did not order induced labor.
- 6. On June 19, 2005, Patient A's twenty-four (24)-hour urine protein test showed seven (7) grams of protein. Her blood pressure ranged from 122-160/70-99. Patient A still suffered from a severe headache. In addition, her oxygen saturation was decreased. Respondent personally reviewed Patient A's chart a third time and, again, did not order induced labor.
- 7. On June 20, 2005, Patient A was diagnosed with sudden onset pulmonary edema. Approximately twenty-two (22) minutes after Patient A was diagnosed with sudden onset pulmonary edema, emergency Caesarean section delivery of the unborn baby was initiated.
- 8. During the emergency Caesarean section delivery of the unborn baby, Patient A suffered a cardiac arrest and died. The Clark County Coroner cited Patient A's cause of death as preeclampsia.
- 9. After resuscitation efforts for Patient A failed, the unborn baby was delivered via Caesarean section. The baby suffered Hypoxia Induced Encephalopathy. As a result, the baby suffered permanent mental and physical disabilities.
- 10. During Patient A's four (4)-day hospital stay, Respondent made four (4) written entries in the patient's chart. Three (3) of the four (4) entries are untimed. All four (4) entries are illegible, either in part or in whole, and are incomplete.

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COUNT I

(Malpractice)

- 11. All of the allegations contained in the above paragraphs are hereby incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.
- 12. Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) 630.040 defines malpractice as the failure of a physician, in treating a patient, to use the reasonable care, skill, or knowledge ordinarily used under similar circumstances.
- 13. NRS 630.301(4) provides that malpractice of a physician is grounds for initiating disciplinary action against a licensee.
- 14. Respondent failed to use reasonable care, skill or knowledge ordinarily used under similar circumstances when he failed to recognize Patient A was suffering from severe preeclampsia and that her unborn child must be immediately delivered to prevent the mother and/or unborn baby from dying or suffering permanent mental and/or physical damage.
- 15. By reason of the foregoing, Respondent is subject to discipline by the Board as provided in NRS 630.352.

COUNT II

(Medical Records Violation)

- 16. All of the allegations in the above paragraphs are hereby incorporated as if fully set forth herein.
- 17. NRS 630.3062(1) provides that the failure to maintain timely, legible, accurate and complete medical records relating to the diagnosis, treatment and care of a patient is grounds for initiating discipline against a licensee.
- 18. Respondent failed to maintain accurate and/or complete medical records relating to the diagnosis, treatment and care of Patient A when he wrote incomplete, untimed and/or illegible entries in Patient A's chart.
- 19. By reason of the foregoing, Respondent is subject to discipline by the Board as provided in NRS 630.352.

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WHEREFORE, the Investigative Committee prays:

- 1. That the Board gives Respondent notice of the charges herein against him and give him notice that he may file an answer to the Complaint herein as set forth in NRS 630.339(2) within twenty (20) days of service of the Complaint;
- 2. That the Board sets a time and place for a formal hearing after holding an Early Case Conference pursuant to NRS 630.339(3);
- 3. That the Board determines the sanctions it will impose if it finds Respondent violated the Medical Practice Act;
- 4. That the Board makes, issues and serves on Respondent, in writing, its findings of facts, conclusions of law and order, which shall include the sanctions imposed; and
- 5. That the Board takes such other and further action as may be just and proper in these premises.
