Overview

In March 2019, I authored an article for the Nevada State Board of Medical Examiners entitled *My Only Love Sprung From My Only Hate: Physician Burnout and Suicide*,¹ which addressed, among other things, how the trauma that physicians deal with may manifest as post-traumatic stress disorder ("PTSD"). Previously, I also wrote an article which focused on the patient's perspective when physicians engage in sexual misconduct.²

In the Spring 2018 Edition of the Federal Bar Association's *SideBAR* publication, I had the privilege of publishing an article entitled *Preparing a PTSD Client for Depositions and Court Testimony*.³ The impetus for writing that article stemmed from my personal experience as a victim,⁴ as a woman who teaches bioethics to medical students, and as a lawyer. The purpose of the 2018 *SideBAR* article was to raise awareness about how abusive or even disrespectful treatment in a workplace or a legal setting can create a triggering event for a client, a witness, or even a lawyer. Unfortunately, despite the oath every lawyer takes, I see lawyers exploit clients, workforce members, and witnesses when they know an individual has post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

Diagnosing and dealing with PTSD is very involved. The residual impacts can last a lifetime. This often creates the need for ongoing therapy, which is costly. While there are many criteria that have to be met to receive a diagnosis of PTSD, according to the DSM-V Manual, PTSD is defined as:

[p]ersistent, distorted cognitions about the cause or consequences of the traumatic event(s) that lead the individual to blame himself/herself or others. Persistent negative emotional state (e.g., fear, horror, anger, guilt, or shame). Markedly diminished interest or participation in significant activities.⁵

PTSD is unique in the sense that it requires an outside actor (i.e., perpetrator of a rape) or an outside event (i.e., war or 911) to create the initial trauma. Subsequently, different events or situations may case an individual diagnosed with PTSD to experience triggering events.⁶

Some questions that I commonly get asked include the following: what is going on when an individual experiences a trigger; how is an individual's memory affected both after an initial trauma or a triggering event; why do different people function differently even after experiencing similar traumatic events; and what is going on from a physical and mental standpoint in the body? The good news is that victims of severe trauma can and do not only survive but thrive.

Chowdhury H. Ahsan, M.D., Ph.D., FACC, Pamela J. Beal and Col. Eric D. Wade, USAF (Ret.) Join Board of Medical Examiners

Chowdhury H. Ahsan, M.D., Ph.D., FACC, Ms. Pamela J. Beal and Col. Eric D. Wade, USAF (Ret.) were appointed by Governor Steve Sisolak to positions on the Nevada State Board of Medical Examiners (Board) effective July 1, 2021. The Board welcomes Dr. Ahsan as a physician member and Ms. Beal and Col. Wade as public members.

Dr. Ahsan is a native of Bangladesh. He received his medical degree from Dhaka Medical College and was awarded the Gold Medal in Medicine. He received the prestigious Commonwealth Scholarship and completed a Ph.D. in Clinical Pharmacology/General Medicine at the University of Southampton in the United Kingdom for his research on the ethnic variation of the pharmacokinetics and pharmacodynamics of calcium channel blockers. Dr. Ahsan completed postgraduate training in Internal Medicine and Cardiovascular Disease at the University of Pennsylvania and Drexel University College of Medicine in Philadelphia, and did his Interventional Cardiology Fellowship at the Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York. He is Board Certified in Internal Medicine, Cardiovascular Medicine, Nuclear Cardiology, and Interventional Cardiology.

Dr. Ahsan was awarded the Young Investigators' Award by the American Society of Nuclear Cardiology in 2001, and American Society of Echocardiography in 2004. He was Associate Professor and the Director of Cardiac Catheterization Laboratory at the University of California, Irvine Medical Center before joining Nevada Heart & Vascular Center. Dr. Ahsan has recently been appointed as Clinical Professor of Medicine by the University of Nevada, Las Vegas School of Medicine (UNLV), and is currently the Director of Cardiac Catheterization Laboratories and Cardiovascular Research at the University Medical Center (UMC). Under his leadership, the Cardiology Fellowship program of UNLV Medicine at University Medical Center, Nevada Heart and Vascular Center and VA Medical Center was established July 1, 2014. Dr. Ahsan is the Director of this Cardiology Fellowship Program. He serves on the editorial board of the journal of World Heart Federation, Global Heart.

Dr. Ahsan was awarded the prestigious Las Vegas HEALS award for his services to the community. He is named in Who's Who and also is listed in World Leaders in Medicine. He is an Honoree of Alpha Omega Alpha Medical Honors Society for his leadership and contribution in Cardiovascular Medicine. Dr Ahsan has recently been elected the Governor of the Nevada Chapter of the American College of Cardiology.

Ms. Beal is the Director of Business Development for Universal Health Services, Spring Mountain Treatment and Sahara Psychiatric Hospitals. Ms. Beal spearheads the planning and execution of all marketing strategies, enhancing the facility's brand/image and oversees all sales and business development efforts.

NOTIFICATION OF ADDRESS CHANGE, PRACTICE CLOSURE AND LOCATION OF RECORDS

Pursuant to NRS 630.254, all licensees of the Board are required to "maintain a permanent mailing address with the Board to which all communications from the Board to the licensee must be sent." A licensee must notify the Board in writing of a change of permanent mailing address within 30 days after the change. Failure to do so may result in the imposition of a fine or initiation of disciplinary proceedings against the licensee.

Please keep in mind the address you provide will be viewable by the public on the Board's website.

Additionally, if you close your practice in Nevada, you are required to notify the Board in writing within 14 days after the closure, and for a period of 5 years thereafter, keep the Board apprised of the location of the medical records of your patients.

including Memory: Prescient Medicolegal Testimony at the International War Crimes Tribunal?

In order to provide greater insights into trauma, memory, and the physiological impact on the body, I reached out to a colleague, J. Douglas Bremner, MD, Director of Emory Clinical Neuroscience Research Unit (Atlanta, Georgia), who

RR: Your background is exceptional. Would you please share with us some of your academic highlights, personal interests, and current projects that you are working on?

is one of the preeminent experts on PTSD. Dr. Bremner is extensively published on a variety of topics related to PTSD,

DB: Thanks for talking with me about this important topic, Rachel. I am a psychiatrist and a professor and have spent my career doing research, writing and treating patients with an emphasis on psychological trauma and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), including brain imaging studies in patients with PTSD, and I was the first medical director of the inpatient treatment program for PTSD at the National Center for PTSD in West Haven, Connecticut, and am now at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia.

RR: What is going on in the brain and the endocrine system when an individual experiences an initial trauma or a triggering event?

DB: The body is set up to respond to life threatening events by activating fear areas like the amgydala that bypass areas like the frontal cortex that are involved in higher order or logical thought. These fear response systems act like a fire alarm and trigger release of cortisol and norepinephrine that cause heart rate and blood pressure to increase and to activate the fight or flight response.

RR: How is an individual's memory affected both after an initial trauma or a triggering event?

DB: Initially, at the time of the traumatic event, memories can be strongly engraved, however, some aspects of the memory can be distorted. We also found, using magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), smaller volume of a brain area involved in short-term memory called the hippocampus, as well as problems with memory, in patients with chronic PTSD.⁷ These physiological changes, however, can reverse with treatment.⁸

RR: Why do different people function differently even after experiencing similar traumatic events?

DB: About 15% of people will develop chronic PTSD after a traumatic event, and that can affect their long-term function. This can be anything from combat to childhood abuse to assault. Some factors that either protect against or mitigate the severity of developing PTSD are education and social support. Yoga and meditation have also proven to serve a vital role in mitigating the effects of PTSD and helping with healing. The more separate traumatic events a person experiences, the greater the likelihood that PTSD will result. The more separate traumatic events are person experiences.

RR: You have studied a number of different individuals who have experienced trauma, as well as settings such as the International War Crimes Tribunal in the Hague and Guantanamo Bay. What were your observations on how attorneys bullied or discredited victims?

DB: My experience is that the legal system is adversarial but there is not enough appreciation for the impact the legal process can have on trauma victims who are often involved in the legal process. Attorneys can take advantage of the fragility or memory issues of trauma victims during depositions or while on the stand to try and raise doubts about the reliability of their testimony. We wrote about this relating to a witness in the International War Crimes Tribunal in The Hague who was a victim of rape in Bosnia and was painted as an unreliable witness. I think greater attention to the needs of victims and awareness of these effects is needed.

RR: From your vantage point as a medical professional, what is the best way that lawyers can protect or advise clients or witnesses on the likelihood of false and often vicious attacks (whether subtle or overt) deployed by other lawyers?

DB: I think more training on trauma and mental health and effects on memory and testimony for attorneys would be useful so they can be more mindful.

RR: Are there any parting thoughts and any of your articles in particular that would benefit the legal and medical professions in understanding PTSD?

DB: Again, I think they need training in mental health and trauma. I actually did a weekend seminar a few years back on psychological trauma for education for counselors and had an attorney give a talk on criminal law and mental health that was quite useful. We also do a seminar on media and criminal law at the International Academy of Law and Mental Health biannual conference that is quite popular.

Recognizing one's own need to seek treatment is crucial, in addition to interacting with patients and clients who have experienced trauma and live with PTSD.

Conclusion

In light of COVID-19, as well as the increased stressors on physicians and lawyers, both as professionals and employers, appreciating what PTSD is, the therapy options available, and how to best address the condition personally or when interacting with a patient, client, or workforce member, are important steps in mitigating the effects of PTSD. Education, therapy, wellness initiatives (i.e., yoga, meditation, sleeping, and healthful eating), and medication may all play a role in effective treatment. Regardless of the source of the trauma, people need to appreciate and realize that there may be legal consequences for conduct. Overall, education and treatment are the primary ways to mitigate additional triggering events and wellness for both professionals and their patients/clients alike.



In 2020, the ratio of physicians to 100,000 population* increased over the previous year. The following graph shows the growth of the state's population (measured in thousands so that the trend line will fit on the graph, and last reported at 3,145,184), the state's active, in-state physician population (in absolute numbers), and the ratio of physicians to population (measured as physicians per 100,000 population). From 2011 through 2015, the ratio averaged between 170 and 174. In 2016, the ratio increased to 177; in 2017, the ratio increased to 178; in 2018 and 2019, the ratio was 181, and in 2020, the ratio increased to 186.

The physician licensure for active, in-state physicians increased by 4% in 2020. The following table is a county-by-county breakdown of physician licenses for the last ten years. In 2020, Carson City, Clark, Douglas, Humboldt, Lander, Nye, Pershing and Washoe Counties showed growth in their physician populations; Lyon and White Pine Counties showed a decrease; and the remaining seven counties remained static in their physician populations.




Disciplinary Actions Taken Against Medical Doctors*




The graph below shows the rate of disciplinary actions taken by the Board per 1,000 active-status licensed physicians for the last ten years.
